

## The Stockholm Winter School, Global Legal Research and Information Management (GRiM): Legal Scholars and New Technologies

The Stockholm Winter School, Global Legal Research and Information Management (GRiM) is funded with support from the European Commission (Lifelong Learning Programme, Erasmus Intensive Programmes).

Participation in GRiM is open to law students enrolled at one of the partner universities. Applications have to be made directly to the GRiM contact person of the partner university concerned. The partner universities apply a common selection policy, including academic excellence, international experience, gender equality and equality of people with disabilities. Students from GRiM's 11 partner universities are eligible to participate in GRiM and receiving certain funding for travel and housing (described on the back side under practical information).

The 11 partner universities and their contact persons are:

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GRiM is an Intensive Programme in the field of higher legal education at the graduate level. GRiM's content focuses on legal information management, legal research management, ICT and eLearning with the objectives of acquainting participants with legal writing skills, legal information management and innovate ICT-based pedagogical methods. The core target group of GRiM are future legal academics who, in their role as teachers of law, will invoke these skills in research and teaching.
