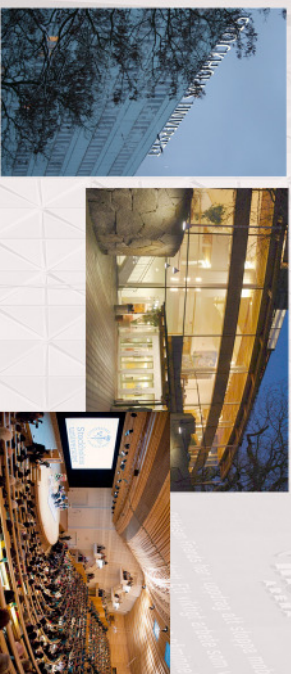


The School of Law and Stockholm University

The School of Law (Juridicum) at Stockholm University is the largest law faculty in Sweden, with app. 3,000 students each year at the undergraduate and graduate levels, and app. 50 doctoral students. The Faculty employs over a hundred full-time teachers for the purposes of teaching and research, with app. 30 professors.

Juridicum at Stockholm University offers five Master Programmes in areas of high topical interest (European Law, Information Technology and Law, European Intellectual Property Law, Commercial Arbitration Law and Environmental Law). The Faculty has established connections with some 70 law schools in the European Union, in addition to special exchange agreements with the U.K., Australia, Canada, the Philippines, Singapore, New Zealand, Peru, China, Thailand and Israel.



Founded in 1878, Stockholm University (SU) is one of the most prestigious centres for higher education and research in the sciences, humanities, law, social sciences and teacher training in Sweden, with 67,000 students, 1,800 doctoral students and 5,000 employees. Several world-leading researchers work here (five Nobel Prizes over the years). In 2012 the annual budget for Stockholm University was about SEK 4.2 billion, of which 60% financed the research and post-graduate education.

Practical Information:

Each student needs to take a laptop with in order to fully participate in GRIM. WiFi access for the students at the university will be arranged.

The estimated costs for students participating in the Winter School is 25% of the travel costs covered, and out-of-pocket costs for local transportation and food, estimated at app. € 450 for the two weeks.

Each student makes and initially pays for their own travel arrangements. As with all EU projects, economy class is to be used. The student must arrive at the latest by Sunday, February 16, 2014, and leave Stockholm at the earliest by Friday, February 28, 2014 with participants' obligations in the program ending by Friday noon.

Each student is allotted a maximum of € 450 for travel, with the student paying 25 %, giving a maximum reimbursement for travel costs of € 337.50. Stockholm University will reimburse these travel costs after the originals of the receipts, boarding passes as well as pertinent payment information, such as SWIFT nos., are provided.

A stay of 12 overnights is required in order for students to receive reimbursement for the travel costs. Housing up to a certain amount is covered by the program for the 12 days covered by the project. Housing costs beyond the allocated amount, as well as private nights outside this framework, are to be arranged and paid for by the student. Housing within the budgeted amount can be reserved by Stockholm University at the youth hostel Zinkensdamm, information available at www.vandrarhemmetzinkensdamm.com.
